1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 The Indian Rugby Football Union

The Indian Rugby Football Union (IRFU) is the sole governing body for the sport of Rugby in India. The IRFU aka Rugby India, responsible for the growth and development of the sport of Rugby across the country, is recognized by the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India and is a full member of the Indian Olympic Association (IOA), Asian Rugby Football Union (ARFU) & World Rugby.

Rugby in India has a rich history and heritage and dates back to 1872. However, only over the last decade has the sport seen a major rise in following and the IRFU has been instrumental in garnering this interest across the country.

Rugby being an Olympic sport, was featured at the 'Rio Olympics' in 2016 and the Tokyo Olympics 2021 and was played by both men & women. Rugby also features as a discipline at various multi-sport events. (Commonwealth Games, Asian Games, Commonwealth Youth Games, Asian Youth Games, World Police and Fire Games, World University Games, World School Games and Asian School Games etc.)

1.2 History

India has a rich legacy of Rugby that dates back to over 100 years (1872). The CC&FC and the Bombay Gymkhana are one of the oldest rugby playing clubs, outside of the UK. The Bombay Cup Tournament is being held since 1892 whereas the All-India National Level Rugby Tournament since 1924. Both these tournaments are Club XVs competitions.

There are 27 States, 300+ Districts, 2000 Schools & Universities across the country that are actively involved in Rugby — played by Men, Women & Age-Grade. Around 150 Clubs play competitive rugby, across the country. Over 100,000+ players (Seniors, Juniors, Sub-Juniors) are involved in the sport, across all forms of the sport (XVs, 10s, Sevens, Touch, Tag etc.)

Women's and age-grade rugby is gaining immense popularity in the country. The Indian National Men's team is currently ranked 84th in the World (out of 105 ranked countries) and 13th in Asia (out of 32 playing Asian nations) whereas The Indian National Women's team is currently ranked 40th in the World (out of 56 ranked countries) and 10th in Asia (out of the 32 playing Asian nations).

Rugby has been included as a full-time sport in the Services (Army, Navy & Air Force) and is also played by the various Police and Para-Military (CRPF) units across the country.

Rugby Sevens is a Medal Event at the National Games of India - 2007 (Guwahati – Men), 2011 (Ranchi – Men), 2015 (Kerala – Men & Women), The Khelo India University Games 2019 (Odisha), and the National Games of India - 2022(Gujarat – Men & Women). Indian National Representative teams, both Men & Women, have participated at the Rugby Sevens event at the Asian Games (Doha-2006, Guangzhou-2010) and Commonwealth Games (Delhi-2010).

India has also hosted an array of International Rugby events (Men, Women and Age-grade) including the Asian Pre-Qualifier to the 2016 Olympics (in March, 2015) and the Asia Rugby Under

18 Girls Championship in 2018 which featured 12 Asian Countries, and the Asia Rugby Championship Division 3 South in 2022.

Rugby has been included as a permanent discipline in the School Games Federation of India (SGFI) for the Under-19, Under-17 and Under-14 age categories, for both boys & girls. Rugby Sevens & Rugby XVs, for both boys & girls, has also been included as part of the National University Games through affiliation with the Association of Indian Universities (AIU). Recently, the sport was also included in the 'Khelo India University Games' and 'Khelo India Winer Games' which were organised by Sports Authority of India (SAI) under the aegis of MYAS.

Rugby, for many years, has been part of the Police departments of various States - Maharashtra State Police (MSP) – Including Greater Mumbai Police (GMP), Pune Police and Kolhapur Police, Tamil Nadu Police, Corps of Military Police (CMP in Karnataka), Kolkata Police & Sergeants Institute (Kolkata) and the Central Reserve Police Force (CRPF). In addition, the sport of Rugby is included as part of the Services Sports Control Board (SSCB) and both the SSCB and the CRPF are affiliated members of the IRFU.

Recently, the Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances and Pensions (Department of Personnel & Training), Govt. of India has included 'Rugby' in the list of games for recruitment of meritorious sports persons to any post under the Group 'C' category in Central Government.

2. ORGANISATION AND FUNCTION

2.1 Organisation

Founded in 1998, the IRFU is the sole governing body of all formats of the sport of Rugby in India for all genders and ages. The formats included are as follows: Rugby Union, Fifteen-a-Side Rugby, Seven-a-Side Rugby, 10-a-Side Rugby, 12-a-Side Rugby, Touch Rugby, Non-Contact Rugby - Tag Rugby, Flag Rugby, Beach Rugby, Snow Rugby, Wheelchair Rugby, Underwater Rugby. Rugby has been included in the School Games Federation of India (SGFI) for all age-groups (U14, U17 & U19 boys & girls) and the National University Games for both Men & Women, under the aegis of the Association of Indian Universities (AIU), The sport is also a part of the Services Sports Control Board (SSCB) and played by the Paramilitary & Police Forces.
